The City will be hosting a meeting to gather public comment on proposed public improvements near the Frank Wing Memorial Park (on Commercial Street) and the City water tank.

The Parks Advisory Committee has been evaluating options to provide opportunities to improve pedestrian and skate board rider features.

All members of the community are invited to participate, and skaters are strongly encouraged to attend the meeting.

Among the ideas under consideration are to add concrete paths between the park and 321st south to Cottage.
Interspersed within the area would be several skating

obstacles. Some of the skate features under consideration are:

Jessie Mays Park Update



A new entry will be created on the south side of the park.

Have you taken a close look at Jessie Mays Park lately? Lots of changes are happening to update the City's largest and most used park.

We are updating the landscaping and thinning and removing over-grown plants. Old stumps will be ground and new hedges, plants, and trees added near the tennis court and playground.

A more formal entryway will be installed between Hillcrest and the building, which will allow better pedestrian access.

The corners of the park on 309th Avenue have also been cleared of brush and will be opened to allow pedestrian access, eliminating the bollard and cable barriers.

A new picnic area will be added by the playground near Wascoe which can be reserved for parties.

Additional seating will be added throughout the park. Council will be

considering a benchsponsorship program soon to allow organizations and families to purchase memorial plaques.

We are ordering new swings for older children and adventurous adults. Play equipment options for toddlers are also being explored.

engaged in a Master Plan
process for Jessie Mays
to plan long-term
improvements like
improving the hall and
park expansion.

Council Election Filing Period Open for November 6, 2012 Election

Persons interested in running for City Council or Mayor must file election papers prior to August 28, 2012.

You may qualify as a candidate if you are eligible to vote in the election and have been a resident of North Plains for the twelve month period immediately preceding the election.

The process for running is fairly simple:

- 1) You must complete 3 one-page forms:
- SEL 101 Candidate Filing form
- SEL 121 Candidate Signature sheet
- SEL 301 Statement

These forms may be downloaded

from www.oregonvotes.org, downloaded from www.northplains.org, or picked up at City Hall during business hours. There is no cost associated with filing forms with the City of North Plains.

- 2) You will need to meet with the City Manager, who serves as the elections officer, and obtain certification for your forms (particularly the signature form).
- **3)** Gather 25 nominating signatures from registered voters who reside in North

Plains and return those forms to the City Manager prior to August 28. Ideally, signatures will be submitted before August 15.
